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Incredible Progress

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Stockport Academy has been ranked 23rd in the country for improvements to it's Progress 8 score over the past academic year. Progress 8 measures how much students improve between the end of primary school and the end of secondary school.

Based on our latest GCSE Results from August 2024, our score is 0.24, which is significantly higher than the average score of 0.09 across Stockport, and even better when compared to national figures of -0.03.

The Department for Education states: "Pupils here achieve up to half a grade higher in each qualification on average, compared to similar pupils across the country." Principal Mrs McCann said: "We're absolutely delighted with this news, which is a reflection of all the hard work and aspiration of our students and staff.

"We are really pleased with the impact our Gain A Grade strategy had with last year's Year 11 and we are fully focussed on supporting this year's cohort in achieving the best they can with their GCSE exams in Summer 2025."

Academy Bank, purchased essential

The challenge required teams to negotiate contracts with retailers, sell their products, and finally present their company's vision and achievements to their peers. The competition was fierce, with one company generating an impressive £3,800 in sales, demonstrating the incredible creativity and business acumen of the students. Prizes were awarded in several categories, celebrating innovation, teamwork, and presentation skills.









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Year 11 Careers Day

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Our recent Careers Day for Year 11 students was deemed a huge success. Students spent the day off their usual timetable, giving them the opportunity to explore a variety of career paths and develop essential skills for their future as part of a series of organised workshops. The event concluded with a vibrant careers fair, where students and their parents could meet representatives from organisations such as the Army, NHS, Stockport College, Cheadle College, The Village Hotel Group, and Futureworks University. This provided further insight into the wide range of career and educational options available.
