

Renowned children's author,
Anthony McGowan, visited us for an incredible day of creative writing workshops.

Anthony, who was the winner of 2020's prestigious Carnegie Medal for Writing, enthralled students with his electrifying, highly informative masterclasses, determined to inspire our students to want to pick up a book!

He began with reminiscences of his school days, painting a vivid picture of how experiences from our past

can provide a wealth of character ideas. This was accompanied by a brief overview of the breadth of his writing, amounting to a staggering fifty books in all!

"Each session was specially tailored to engage students with varying degrees of interest in reading, with Anthony managing to choose the perfect book every time.

### Y10 Berlin Trip

Our Year 10 History students recently embarked on an enriching history trip to Berlin, immersing themselves in the city's profound historical sites as part of their GCSE studies. The first full day kicked off with a guided walking tour of Berlin, where students visited iconic landmarks such as Checkpoint Charlie, the site of Hitler's secret bunker, and the Radisson hotel, famously known for its aquarium burst. The group then paid their respects at the Memorial to the Murdered Jews before enjoying lunch at Brandenburg Gate. The day concluded with visits to the Topography of Terror and the Berlin Wall Memorial, followed by a

relaxing evening at the hotel.
Thursday's itinerary was equally packed, starting with a visit to the iconic TV tower for panoramic views of the city. Students navigated Berlin's metro to explore the Palace of Tears and the Reichstag, including its historic dome. After a brief rest, they toured the Stasi Prison Museum, gaining insights into its turbulent past.



On Friday, the final excursion took students to the Stasi Headquarters, the former GDR Ministry for State Security. The engaging visit was followed by a shopping trip to Alexanderplatz before returning to the hotel to prepare for the journey home.

Head of History Ms Reed said: "This was an incredible experience for both students and staff. Seeing our Year 10s engage with what they'd been learning in their History lessons was truly rewarding, and our action-packed itinerary meant we really made the most of this opportunity that will stay with them for years to come."










### Making A Bang!

One of our Year 9 students was invited to compete in the Northern England finals of the esteemed Big Bang STEM Competition.

This esteemed contest, dedicated to fostering innovation in Science, Technology, Engineering and Maths (STEM) fields, acknowledges the exceptional talent and ingenuity of its entrants.

His innovative concept, 'party panels', captured the attention of judges, as cutting-edge solar panels that not only harness renewable

energy but also boast enhanced functionality and aesthetic appeal, setting them apart from traditional models.

Mrs. Staniforth, Head of Science, said: "It is truly remarkable to advance to the finals of such a prestigious competition. We had an amazing day and the judges were really impressed with the concept!"

### **STEM Challenge Success**

A group of our Year 9s had their engineering skills put to the test during a STEM challenge day at Old Trafford.

The event was hosted by Global
Underwater Hub who design
Remotely Operated Vehicles (ROVs)
that work in the sea for a variety of
purposes, including clearing plastic
pollution, fixing underwater cables
that power offshore wine turbines
and helping the Royal Navy.
A team of six of our Year 9 students
took on the task of designing their
own ROV that would work in shallow
waters to gather data about areas
with high plastic pollution. Students
had to build their own robot,

program the robot to complete specific challenges, design a company logo and design a 3D model of what their ROV would look like.

After a day of preparing, the team

then pitched their ROV to a panel of expert judges (from the Royal Navy and Global Underwater Hub). In their presentation, they talked through their TV advert storyboard, the various sensors they had built into their ROV (e.g. A distance sensor which works through echolocation to detect objects nearby), the market cost of their ROV and its unique turtle design.

Science Teacher Ms Quigley-Curror, who organised the trip, said: "This

was a phenomenal experience for our students, who learned a lot about some of the options that pursuing a career in Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics (STEM) can offer. "Thank you to Global Underwater Hub and Manchester United Foundation for giving us the opportunity to get involved!"
